Message from Artist

French organ music, known as 'music of colour'. At the heart of the history of French music lies the greatest composer of the 20th century, Olivier Messiaen. The unique techniques and systems he created formed the basis for opening new musical doors across the centuries. On the other hand, his organ music also offers a glimpse of the tradition that has been handed down to organists since the French Revolution. The fascination of Messiaen, which can only be seen through the organ, can be conveyed here. Please enjoy it together with the organ of Kanagawa Kenmin Hall.

KATO Maiko

Biography

KATO Maiko has studied in Japan with KOGA Chieko, TOZAWA Mayumi, HIRONO Tsuguo and SHIINA Yuichiro. She graduated from Elisabeth University of Music, the organ department of the Conservatoire de Toulouse with a Première Prix, and in 2011, she obtained her Master of Music at the National University of Arts at Tokyo. She came to France in order to specialize on the organ builder Cavaille-Coll. In 2013, she received her DEM in clavecin (harpsichord) from the Conservatoire de Toulouse with unanimous praise from the jury. In 2014, she graduated from the Conservatoire National des Arts de Toulouse with a national diploma. She won the Jean-Louis Florentz International Organ Competition in 2010. In 2013, she was a finalist in the Zilberman International Organ

Competition. In the same year, she won the third prize and the audience prize at the Xavier Dallas International Organ Competition. She has been invited to perform at the Toulouse International Organ Festival, as well as in Saint-Cyprien, Saint-Antoine, Montauban, Aix-en-Provence and elsewhere. She has also performed with the Orchestre National de Toulouse, the natural horn player Gilles Lambach and the sackbut player Daniel Lassalle. She is currently organist at Lutheran Junior and Senior High Schools, and is a lecturer at Kwassui women's university. She is also a member of the Japanese Organists' Association and the Japanese Organ Society.
